

Two Children. Gone. Justice Delayed. Justice Denied.

UnJust: Monster is a dual-narrative true crime book that parallels the still-unsolved murder of JonBenét Ramsey—now nearing its 30th anniversary—with the wrongful conviction of Sabrina Butler-Smith, the first woman in the U.S. to be exonerated from death row.

At just 17, Sabrina's baby, Walter, died unexpectedly. She ran for help—but was arrested, charged, and sentenced to die. Years later, she cleared her name. JonBenét's case, in contrast, became a media obsession—shaped by privilege, press strategy, and public perception.

Though their stories seem worlds apart, both reveal how narrative—not evidence—often defines justice. One child's death became a global headline. The other was nearly erased. UnJust:

Monster gives both a voice.

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Told with restraint, and grounded in deep research, the story unfolds through a neutral, fact-driven lens.
